“The Coliseum in Rome” by Roy DeBellis



At our next meeting on August 17th, after a delicious dinner prepared by Baldo and his staff, we will present a subject with which practically everybody has some familiarity – the Roman Coliseum, A Symbol of Roman Culture.

“The Games” became an institution under Julius Caesar and part of the Roman fabric. The games had a life of their own. Over a hundred years later in 75 A.D. the Emperor Vespasian starting building the Coliseum, although he had vowed to “put an end to this game nonsense.” It was opened by his son, Titus in 80 A.D. and finished by his other son,

Domitian in 85 A.D. The Coliseum was built in a miraculously short time of 10 years by a people devoid of mathematical expressions and modern equipment but full of genius and creativity. The Coliseum has been called an edifice two thousand years ahead of its time. Its characteristics are mind boggling: it held 50 thousand Romans in 4 levels; it had a retractable roof. It had 80 entrances and could be emptied in minutes. Perfumed fountains sweetened the air. Mock but deadly naval battles were fought there. Thousands of animals imported from all corners of the Empire ended up in the Coliseum. Criminals went to their reward and gladiators sometimes won their freedom with a brave stand. The Romans forgot their troubles at the Coliseum. It was the primary Roman amphitheater for 400 years! Come and join us as we go back in time to see what it was like to be in the Coliseum during its glory days – *Roy DeBellis*.

“Miraculous Canals of Venice” - a documentary

At our meeting on July 20th, we had a delightful buffet prepared by Baldo and his staff. The menu included ham and melon, a warm potato salad, bruschetta, mushrooms in a white sauce, rolled & stuffed baked eggplant, Italian rice balls (Arancini), meatballs, pasta in red sauce, Baldo’s delicious gelato, wine and coffee. Nine outstanding courses!

After dinner we viewed the 45 minute video: “MIRACULOUS CANALS OF VENICE,” introduced by and provided by the courtesy of Mr. Pete Puleo. Venice is among the most beautiful and complex cities in the world. Built in the water on wooden poles and whose economy was based on salt, this jewel of Western Civilization has held its own against time and tide for about 1,500 years. The building methods and architecture are unique. Wooden poles by the millions that later petrified were driven into the Venetian marsh to afford solid footing. This was topped with

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wood planks and then by Istrian marble, impervious to the seawater. Brick-work was added last to form the construction layers of Venice's buildings. Ornate facades were common and announced Venice's economic success for all to see. In this rare glimpse, the video revealed the fear that motivated Venetians to transform a marshy lagoon into a thriving, romantic metropolis. Surprisingly, the city's first inhabitants were fleeing the German Lombards and bloodthirsty barbarians like Attila the Hun, who swept down the Italian Peninsula in his raids against the Roman Empire. Home to such artists as Titian and Bellini and composers Monteverdi and Vivaldi, Venice was rich in cultural background. Now because of rising seawater levels and eroding buildings, Venice is threatened as it "sinks" about 5 inches per century. Its future is uncertain as ways are investigated to stop the sinking. MIRACULOUS CANALS OF VENICE was an in-depth look at the history of this timeless city.

Il circuito delle dimore Sabaude

Emanuele Filiberto di Savoia trasferisce nel 1563 da Chambéry a Torino la capitale del suo ducato e da quel momento gli interessi territoriali della Casa si spostano al di qua delle Alpi. Nel contempo i duchi di Savoia - poi principi di Carignano, re di Sicilia, re di Sardegna e, finalmente, re d'Italia - prendono a costituire sul territorio piemontese un sistema di residenze che risponde ad esigenze difensive, produttive o di passatempo. Con la cessione e la demanializzazione, tra Ottocento e Novecento, da parte di Casa Savoia, le dimore sabaude sono diventate museo di se stesse. Il circuito delle Residenze Reali dei Savoia rappresenta un insieme di grande interesse storico, artistico ed ambientale, tanto che nel 1997 è stato dichiarato dall'UNESCO "Patrimonio dell'umanità".

Ci sono quindici castelli nel circuito delle dimore Sabaude:



Palazzo Reale

Uno su tutti, il Palazzo Reale, progettato dal Castellamonte, è tuttora considerato tra le più sfarzose regge europee. Iniziato nel 1646 dalla madama reale Cristina di Francia, moglie del duca Vittorio Amedeo I, è stata la residenza ufficiale dei duchi e poi dei re sabaudi per oltre due secoli. Nelle sale di ricevimento e negli alloggi privati, è possibile ammirare preziosi affreschi, quadri, arazzi, mobili e porcellane, importanti testimonianze dell'arte dal '600 all'800. Statue seicentesche decorano la fontana e le aiuole dei giardini disegnati dal francese Le Nôtre, il famoso architetto dei giardini di Versailles.



Palazzo Madama Al centro di Piazza Castello, questa residenza racchiude la storia millenaria di Torino, poiché comprende in un unico edificio, le torri della romana Porta Pretoria, il Castello quattrocentesco di Ludovico d'Acaja e la scenografica facciata, aggiunta nel 1721 da Filippo Juvarra, quando, perduta la funzione difensiva, era diventata l'elegante Palazzo della "madame" reali. Le sale del Palazzo sono inserite in un complesso progetto di restauro, in vista della riapertura del Museo Civico di Arte Antica.



Palazzina di Caccia di Stupinigi Il lungo viale fiancheggiato da cascine e scuderie conducono il visitatore alla vista della Palazzina, la cui destinazione per la caccia è simboleggiata dalla statua di cervo sul tetto.

La residenza, progettata da Filippo Juvarra, ha un'originale pianta a quattro bracci, disposti a croce di Sant'Andrea, che si uniscono in un fastoso salone ellittico. La palazzina ospita, nelle splendide sale affrescate, il Museo dell'Arte e dell'Ammobiliamento, una preziosa raccolta di capolavori dell'ebanisteria piemontese.

Gli altri castelli nel circuito sono: Palazzo Carignano, Castello del Valentino, Villa della Regina, La Reggia di Venaria Reale, Castello de La Mandria, Castello di Rivoli, Castello Ducale di Agliè, Castello di Moncalieri, Castello di Racconigi, Castello di Pollenzo, Castello di Govone e La Reggia di Valcasotto. Tutti sono visitabili tranne Castello di Pollenzo e La Reggia di Valcasotto che sono proprietà private.
